
Nancy Frye

Safari


This features zebra print border, with strip-pieced printed fabrics.

Here are the first two of a planned series of eight drawn and painted wholecloth quilts based on the historic bathhouses of Hot Springs, Arkansas which Marie and I visited in November 2018 on the way home from the International Quilt Festival in Houston, Texas. These are each 21.5" wide x 15" high; one yet to be done is a larger building and will be twice as wide. I selectively traced the front elevation drawings available online from the Historic American Buildings Survey, then painted the sky, roof, windows, and background vegetation using my photos from our visit for reference. I am still contemplating exactly how the eight units will be put together once all of them are completed.
